

Timeline and Services for Hazardous Materials and Fire Debris Removal

	Check out free government services before paying for private hazardous materials removal
1	 The Federal Government will remove hazardous materials and fire debris for free
	 You can only rebuild once LA County certifies the property has been cleared
2	You must opt in to the Corps of Engineer's by March 31, 2025 by completing a <u>Right-of-Entry</u>
	Form at recovery.lacounty.gov
	• You are automatically included in the EPA clear up if your property has structural damage
	• If you do not opt-in to the Corps of Engineers program, you will automatically opt out
3	The EPA Phase 1 program will finish removing hazardous materials from property by the end of February, 2025 <i>at no cost to you</i>
	The EPA will hand-remove paint, cleaners, solvents, oils, batteries (including lithium iron batteries from vehicles, etc.), pasticides, visible ashestes, and pressurized fuel evlipters
	batteries from vehicles, etc.), pesticides, visible asbestos, and pressurized fuel cylinders
	The EPA has a <u>"parcel status lookup</u> " map that identifies properties eligible for clean-up, as well as clean up progress one gov/california wildfires
	as well as clean-up progress <u>epa.gov/california-wildfires.</u> The Army Corps of Engineers Phase 2 program will remove unsafe fire debris and ash from
4	destroyed buildings, starting in March 2025 with the last properties completed by 2026
	 Only buildings qualify, not patios, driveways, lawns, etc.
	 Buildings are structures with four walls, a foundation, and larger than 120 square feet (e.g.,
	homes, sheds, garages).
	 Clear up will happen in clumps, so ensure your neighbors apply for clean-up too
5	Cleanup of other debris may be covered LA County DPW
	 If you have insurance that specifically covers clean up, you should use that first
	 DPW may cover any clean-up that goes beyond your insurance costs
	 Federal clean-up is first-come, first-serve, so submit your opt-in Right of Entry form now
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Documents Required to Complete Right of Entry Form

The County of Los Angeles is working with the Environmental Protection Agency, the United States Army Corps of Engineers, and other federal and state agencies in a joint program to facilitate the safe removal and disposal of fire debris and ash. To obtain this service, property owners must submit documentation allowing the agencies access to their property.

□ Download and complete the Right-of-Entry Form at recovery.lacounty.gov

□ Copy of government-issued identification (ID) (driver's license, passport, etc.)

□ Insurance policy (homeowners must disclose if they do not have insurance) with the following:

- Declaration page
- Debris removal coverage page
- □ Assessor's Parcel Number (APN)
- □ Signatures of all Owners, Trustees, or Power of Attorney

□ If you are not the property owner, then you need a signed and notarized document for authorized agent

□ Sketch of property, including locations of all structures, survey monuments, septic tanks, water wells, utilities, etc.
